

- Camp Axton, Pittsylvania County: 1951-1965
- Camp Covington, Covington: closed 1976
- Camp Garth Newel, Bath County: 1955-1965
- Camp Massawomee Program Center, Rockbridge County: 1979-2004
- Camp Sacajawea Program Center, Lynchburg/Bedford County: 1955-present
- Camp Shawnee Program Center, Pittsylvania County: 1968-2004
- Camp Sugar Hollow Program Center, Crozet/Albemarle County: 1959-present
- Lake Catherine, Botetourt County: 1968-1976
- Camp Dark Hollow, Roanoke County: 1950-2007
- Camp Kiwanianna, Montgomery County: 1940-1975
- Camp Icimani Adventure Center, Roanoke County: 2007-present

Anniversary Celebration Patches

The triangular patch was for the 80th Anniversary of Girl Scouts. Councils participated in the national Girl Scout service project, Caring for the Earth, by doing environmental service projects. Virginia Skyline Council's service project was to improve wildlife habitats. Some of the troops made blue bird houses or bird feeders. Others helped put used Christmas trees in lakes

to protect fish or learned about pesticides and their effect on the environment. Troops earned a segment to go with this anniversary patch. Below is a picture of fun patches celebrating the 35th, 40th, 45th and 50th council anniversaries.
