Complete four activities.

1. Try acting out some skits from a book of skits or acting out skits you have learned at camp or school.
2. Develop your own skit to tell a favorite story or make up a story and act it out. Your leader can help you write down the words of your story or skit.
3. Make costumes for the skit. You can use clothes that belong to your brothers and sisters or parents. You can make costumes out of paper, cloth, ribbon, or other things that you can find to use to create the characters in your skit.
4. Find out what a prop is. How are props used in plays? Make props for your skit to help you tell the story.
5. Does your skit need scenery to help tell the story? Make background scenery to help the audience see where the story takes place. (If the story takes place outside, for example, the scenery might include trees, clouds, and flowers.)
6. Perform your skit for your families and friends.
7. Perform your skit at your school, at a nursing home, at a daycare center, or at a Girl Scout event for other troops.
